Other considerations would be entryway lighting, colors, textures and lines. You want everything to compliment the area, but not overwhelm it.

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
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Hudson Garden Club April General Meeting

"Wildflowers & Waterfalls"

Come along on a talk and see wildflowers and waterfalls with our guide Denny Reiser. Denny has been identifying and photographing wildflowers for many years and has used this knowledge while teaching in public school and leading wildflower walks in our local parks. Along the way, he shares some methods of identifying wildflowers, suggestions on where others can be found and places to find great waterfalls. Places that are good for waterfalls also seem to be good places for wildflowers. Photography hints will also be shared.

Denny retired from teaching in the spring of 1998 and in the spring of 1999 he took Master Garden training at Quail Hollow State Park in Hartsville. Soon after finishing the Master Gardener workshop he was offered a job as a seasonal part-time ranger at Cuyahoga Valley National Park. His Master Gardener training was and is helpful to him today.

Denny has had a number of his photos appear in Cuyahoga Valley National Park Publications, Metro Park Publications and in several books.
