

### FIELD TRIP TO CBG PROGRAM Thursday, April 11, 2019

HGC is an Affiliate Club member at the Cleveland Botanical Garden. The CBG sponsors an annual Affiliate Day event, and this year an outstanding program is planned. The Affiliate Council will host Lisa Waud, floral designer and artist, who transformed abandoned and ready-for-tear-down homes in Detroit into floral art exhibits and helped create the city's Flower Week. Her program is "Flower House — Beauty from Blight." You won't want to miss this event!

Free admission, free parking, light refreshments. Two sessions are available: Morning session (8:30am - 11am), including a continental breakfast. Afternoon session (12:30pm - 3pm) including light appetizers. You must register in advance and you must be registered by April 4, 2019. To register, go to www.cbgardens.org, then Support the Garden, then Affiliate Bulletin Board and within the program information you will see where to click to register. (You are welcome to go to the morning session but carpools from the Acme Plaza parking lot just south of McDonald's parking are for the afternoon session only.)

"Flower House Detroit" was a floral art installation conceived by floral designer and contemporary artist Lisa Waud of Pot & Box. Held in a formerly abandoned property Waud purchased for \$500, she was inspired by the works of Christo and Jean Claude - long term planning, short exhibition. With this model and her collaborative spirit, she initiated plans to create a project with her day-to-day medium - flowers and plants - in the vacant properties. Over three days in October 2015, florists and designers from across the U.S. and Canada filled the entire 18room house with American-grown flowers. 3,500 visitors and press from around the country than gathered to walk through the exhibition in awe and amazement. Initially Lisa planned to use proceeds from the ticket sales to responsibly demolish the house to make way for a flower farm for her business. Instead, she has turned the land into a public garden and cutting farm for her business.

Lisa will share the story of the project from inception through execution as well as her involvement in Detroit Flower Week. In business for 11 years, Pot & Box has become Detroit's well-known and sought after studio for fresh event flowers and container gardening services and is the modern plant source for the city.

TULIPS....
IT MUST
BE SPRING!!

Tulips are said to signal the arrival of spring...so celebrate and use these tips to make them last longer.

- Buy blooms that have the color developed but are still tightly closed.
- Harden off the flowers by wrapping the whole bunch tightly in paper, cut the stem ends on an angle and place in clean, cold water. Let them condition this way in a cool (or cold) spot for a couple of hours before arranging.
- Use a tall vase to support the growing stems.
- Make sure the vase is absolutely clean.
- Use fresh, cold water with no additives. That means do not add pennies, sugar, lemon-lime soda, aspirin or bleach. All tulips need is fresh, cold water, preferably not treated by a water conditioner.
- Remove any leaves that fall below the water line. Remember that the tulips will grow taller.
- Place your arrangement in a cool spot, away from heat and bright light.

### GENERAL MEETING MINUTES March 21, 2019

On Thursday, March 21, forty-one members and guests gathered to hear the presentation on green roofs given by Len Lampert.

President, Jan Lindstrom, opened the meeting with a welcome and an announcement that the newsletter will be sent early to allow members time to register for an upcoming field trip.

Using photos displayed on the screen, Len explained the difference between green and vegetable roofs, design options, advantages, required maintenance and sustainability. He explained that roof structures need to be adequate to support the layers of growing medium and plants as well as allow for drainage and stop supports to keep the material from sliding off.

Len showed photos of buildings both locally and around the world that have installed these environmentally friendly roof gardens. Many are at schools (Laurel School, CWRU, OSU) or businesses (Cuyahoga County offices) and include walking paths benches and picnic tables.
