A Note from Michael Weinzierl 2011 HGC Scholarship Recipient

This first semester at Hamilton College was great in expanding my knowledge of agriculture, horticulture and environmental related topics. From Biology and related labs we conducted we learned a fair amount about populations, successional forests, effects of fires and other natural phenomena on landscapes and a lot about plant anatomy and reproductive cycles. We spent several weeks extracting and sequencing DNA from a Goldenrod flower species and we used this data to identify the exact species of Goldenrod just from sequences of its DNA.

In my environmental class I learned about natural cycles and effects of humans on environment.

I look forward to the second semester. I am enrolled in Bio 102, Spanish 200, Russian Film, and Oceanography I have spent some time in the Hamilton Green House. I have had an excellent start to my college career and am very grateful to the Hudson Garden Club for making this possible.

Ohio Enters New Hardiness Zone

The U.S. Department of Agriculture released its Plant Hardiness Zone Map, the first update since 1990, that shifts most of Ohio from Zone 5 to Zone 6. The new map reflects sustained warming in the Buckeye State and much of the country.

The new map, available online at planthardiness.ars.usda.gov, was put together using more-sophisticated tools and a much longer period of temperature data than was used in previous charts. The Plant Hardiness Zone Map is the standard by which gardeners and growers determine which plants are most likely to make it through the winter at a given location.

What can I plant now that our hardiness zone has gone from 5 to 6 is a common question as the gardener enters this new hardiness arena. There are very few new items to add to your planting palette, and proper planting and planning remain the key for success with any plant, regardless of hardiness rating. *Cleveland Plain Dealer*

LIQUID DEER REPELLENT RECIPE

3 eggs

1/3 cup liquid dishwashing soap
1/3 cup Tabasco Sauce (1 small jar)
2 beef bouillon cubes dissolved in a cup of water
Mix in a blender and pour into a gallon tank
sprayer and fill with water.

Spray thoroughly once a week.

This year they have been able to transition to 100% biodegradable pots which are made of rice and bamboo.
