## COOKIES FOR GARDEN SHOP TEA ROOM

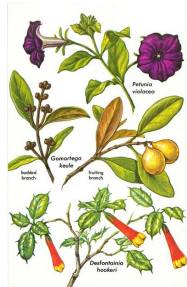

## Herb Group Field Trip

Gardening really starts to kick into high gear in May and the Herb Group will be exploring some family-owned plant farms and greenhouses. We will begin the day in Canal Fulton at Manda's Plant Farm. With so many big box stores selling plants these days, it's wonderful to find a second generation family-owned and operated local business and they have been there for over 40 years.

Jill Manda is a fellow Master Gardener, has a wonderful growing operation and wonderful plants, too! This unobtrusive collection of greenhouses sits back from the road in the embrace of eighty acres of woods. Everything is locally grown and the plants are chemical free. No insecticides or herbicides are used in her greenhouses and the colorized sections make choosing easy and fun!

We will then head over to Hartville to Miller's Greenhouse. This family-owned greenhouse started in 1984 with just one greenhouse and now has 22 greenhouse bays. Miller's grows for Spring sales only and closes by mid-June, so we are getting there at a perfect time. They have a large variety of annuals, perennials, foliage plants, tropicals, vegetables, herbs, succulents and unusual plants, along with customer container plantings.

There will also be the opportunity to check out the Herb Garden at Quail Hollow State Park if the weather permits (2 miles away). Lunch will be at the Maize Valley Market and Winery in Hartville.

The Hudson Garden Club has announced four recipients of the Genevieve Jyurovat Horticultural Scholarship Award. The recipients pictured above are: Will Hogan from Hudson High School, David Farrell from Ohio State University ATI (Agricultural Technical Institute), Michael Whitacre from Ohio State University and Cara Lauria (not shown) from the College of Charleston.

**Farrell**, a second time winner, is currently in the Horticultural program at Ohio State University ATI (Agricultural Technical Institute) and is a member of the Landscape Club. His part-time and summer work at KGK Gardening and Landscaping Company has given him experience in many levels of horticultural and landscape projects. In Fall of 2015 he plans to include classes on sustainable plant systems, design and plant installation to complete his Associate Degree and transfer to the OSU main campus to complete a BS degree in Landscape Horticulture. Would like to own his own business.

**Lauria**, a second time winner, is a senior in Geology and Environmental Geosciences at the College of Charleston. During her years there she has been involved in several research projects and has served an internship in Water Quality monitoring in Eastern states, Geologic mapping in several western states and a field study in a Marine and Coal Ecological research project in Puerto Rico as well as many other activities. Cara has been accepted into the University of Colorado's Environmental Studies program where she plans to study climate change and climate science.

**Whitacre**, a second time winner, is attending Ohio State University in the Environmental Science program. While there he has been a member of the University Chorus and has often taken advantage of open lab time in the Biology Department to review specimens. He has completed the science courses at OSU in Mansfield and plans to continue his courses at the main campus of OSU in the Fall semester. He expects to pursue a career in teaching in order to do what his science teachers have done for him and perhaps seek a further degree in environmental science or aquatic biology.

**Hogan**, a student at Hudson High, has been active in sports, playing both football and lacrosse for four years, receiving Athletic Awards for both. He is a member of the National Honor Society and was part of the Leadership Planning Committee. He has also been involved with the youth group and service projects at his church, participating in a service project to West Virginia. He plans to attend the College of Engineering at Miami University to secure a degree in Environmental Engineering. His ultimate goal is to work toward preserving the environment for future generations.

Larry Giblock, Lead Horticulturalist with the Cleveland Botanical Garden will present his program **"Eating Your Landscape"** and will introduce the audience to edible plants that many people have on their property. He will explain the usefulness of the different plants and will identify several plants we may want to add to our gardens. He will also cover the cultural requirements and give recipes for each.

Giblock has been with CBG for 25 years, working mainly with the native plant collection. Native plants are his real passion. In addition to his duties at CBG (Cleveland Botanical Garden) he sat on the Steering Committee helping to form the Native Plant Society of Northeast Ohio. Larry currently sits on the Native Plant Promotion Committee, a part of LEAP (The Lake Erie Allegheny Partnership) an organization formed to help guide decisions that affect Lake Erie and the counties that drain into it.

## **HGC 2015 SPRING PLANT EXCHANGE** **Veterans Way Park Pavilion** **Tuesday, May 19, 2015 at 7:00pm**

For the past 29 years, the Hudson Garden Club has welcomed the community to share in the time-honored tradition of Spring and Fall plant exchanges. Thousands of plants have found homes and brought joy as they grew, many also being shared again years later, and the cycle continues. In many respects, little has changed from the early days when the rule was "bring a plant and take a plant" and if you don't have any, pay a nominal price.

This is not a fund raiser for the club; it truly is sharing plants from our home gardens. This is also a great opportunity to visit the park. The Hudson Garden Club donates through our only fundraiser, the Home & Garden Tour, some of the monies towards trees and other projects in the Parks and throughout the City and we have a wonderful relationship with all.

2015 brings changes to the long-standing tradition for the Spring and Fall Plant Exchanges. **We are moving our location from Hudson Springs Park to one of our newer Hudson Parks—Veterans Way Park.** We hope to make this our permanent home. Veterans Way Park is located at 55 Veterans Way near downtown and is accessed from Route 91 (the traffic light by Starbuck's) or Milford Drive (which runs behind ACME Plaza). The pavilion is just off the parking lot adjacent to the children's playground, making it easy to carry plants to share and take home. It's only steps away.

**The date is Tuesday, May 19 at 7:00pm. This is always a fun event for the HGC members and the community. The check-in will begin at 6:00pm and the exchange will start promptly at 7:00pm.**

**CHECK IN:** Each plant needs to be **divided** and **labeled** and brought potted in good condition to the exchange. \*\*\*A label has been designed that will keep all the plants uniformly marked and easy for those volunteering and those choosing plants. The label identifies the plant, providing **name, color, height, bloom time** and **growing needs**, i.e.: sun shade, etc. We welcome as many plants as you would like to share, with the **exception of any groundcovers (no groundcover will be accepted)** or if it is a known invasive variety perennial or herb.

**\*\*\*Invasive plants will not be accepted\*\*\***

\*No more than two plants of the following will be accepted:

- Herbs: lemon balm, mints, chives, valerian, tansy and bee balm (monarda)
- Fast spreading perennials: roadside Daylilies, Yarrow, Gooseneck Loosestrife, Black-eyed Susans, Shasta daisies, Obedient plant, Coreopsis and Violets, among others

**TICKETS:** One ticket will be issued for every standard size plant you bring. You may use tickets to purchase plants from the exchange and if you have leftover tickets, they may be used for a plant exchange held in the same year. If you do not have any plants to share, plants may be purchased at the end of the exchange.

All plants, excluding the premium plants, which are labeled as such, are available for one ticket/or \$1.00. Premium plants are priced slightly higher.

This is a wonderful and fun tradition for both the Garden Club and the residents of Hudson and beyond. Please come out and join us and hope for a sunny day....there is not a rain date.

Don't forget to bring containers to take your plant home in!
