Each year as a result of the profits realized during the Hudson Home & Garden Tour the Hudson Garden Club is able to consistently support the City of Hudson and the Tree Commission in its efforts to beautify our city with the planting and care of city trees. It is only one of the many legacies of our Club which makes Hudson such a unique and special place to live. These profits are made possible only by your generous volunteerism.

Next year HGC has a goal of being able to provide \$11,000 dollars to the City of Hudson for the planting and care of ten trees in Markillie Cemetery as well as the purchase of 26 street trees lost to disease last year. Your help is appreciated.

Grants Awarded to Seven Worthy Projects with Proceeds from the Annual Home & Garden Tour

In December 2015 the Hudson Garden Club awarded \$11,692.06 in grants to seven projects that further the mission of the Club which is dedicated to spreading the love of gardening, the beautification of public property and the support of education in horticulture and related fields. From 2000 through 2015 the Club has awarded \$133,502.06 in grants through its Grants Committee process which is separate from, and in addition to, the monies distributed each year for city trees, parks and scholarships.

The following programs or projects were awarded grants as recommended by its Grants Committee and affirmed by the Hudson Garden Club Board:

Hudson Library & Historical Society 90th anniversary of Winnie the Pooh to host garden historian and designer Kathryn Asito to educate the community about the flora and fauna of the Ashdown Forest, inspiration behind the Pooh stories.

City of Hudson for maintenance of baskets and planters on Main Street from Park Lane to Owen Brown.

East Woods School to create a space that will serve as a setting for regular classroom activities, as well as providing an area where students can observe seasonal changes, planting and caring for plants, trees and bushes.

Conservancy for Cuyahoga Valley National Park to provide funding for lower income children to attend CVNP programs.

Hudson Montessori School (Middle School) to build small individual hoop houses over the raised garden beds on the middle school's campus. They have five individual raised beds.

Cleveland Botanical Garden Green Corps Urban Farming Program of CBG. Beautify farms and attract more pollinating insects and birds.

The Sunday Afternoon Gardeners to restore Goldsmith Garden at Hale Farm.

The pictures tell the story — three bulbs planted at the November general meeting, all the same type (Lemon Star), all placed in the same room, all watered at the same time with the same amount, all getting the same light exposure...and all growing at different rates! Part of the fascination with this plant is the ease of growing it and anticipation of the big bright blooms. Most will have 4 or up to 6 blooms on each stem!

We know of at least two members who are holding one bulb back, planning to plant it in Spring with the hope of having the expected bloom for a Home & Garden Tour arrangement. Since gardeners in zones 7-10 plant these outside for their bloom in the garden, and get to pick them for bouquets and arrangements in the summer, why can't we give it a try?
