Hudson Garden Club's 2017 Fall Plant Exchange at VETERANS WAY PARK PAVILION Saturday, September 23, 2017

For almost 30 years, the Hudson Garden Club has welcomed the community to share in the time-honored tradition of spring and fall plant exchanges. Thousands of plants have found new homes and brought joy as they grew, many also being shared again years later, and the cycle continues. In many respects, little has changed from the early days when the rule was "bring a plant, and take a plant," and if you don't have any, pay a nominal price.



This is not a fundraiser for the club; it truly is sharing plants from our home gardens. This is also a great opportunity to visit the park. The Hudson Garden Club donates through our only fundraiser, the Home & Garden Tour, some of the monies towards trees and other projects in the Parks and throughout the City, and we have a wonderful relationship with all.

Veterans Way Park is located at 55 Veterans Way near downtown and is accessed from Rt. 91 (the traffic light by Starbuck's) or Milford Drive (which runs behind ACME Plaza). The pavilion is just off the parking lot adjacent to the children's play ground, making it easy to carry plants to share and take home. It's only steps away.

The date is Saturday, September 23, 2017. This is always a fun event for the HGC members and the community. The check-in will begin at 9:00am and the exchange will start promptly at 10:00am.

Check in: Each plant needs to be **divided** and **labeled** and brought potted in good condition to the Exchange. ***A label has been designed that will keep all the plants uniformly marked and easy for those volunteering and those choosing plants. The label identifies the plant, providing **name**, **color**, **height**, **bloom time and growing needs**, i.e.: sun, shade, etc. We welcome as many plants as you would like to share, with the **exception of any groundcovers (no groundcover will be accepted)** or if it is a known invasive variety perennial or herb. ***Invasive plants will not be accepted*** No more than two plants of the following will be accepted: Herbs: lemon balm, mints, chives, valerian, tansy and bee balm (monarda). Fast spreading perennials: roadside Daylilies, Yarrow, Gooseneck Loosestrife, Black-eyed Susans, Shasta daisies, Obedient plant, Coreopsis and Violets, among others.

Tickets: One ticket will be issued for every standard size plant you bring. You may use tickets to purchase plants from the exchange. If you do not have any plants to share, plants may be purchased at the end of the exchange.

All plants, excluding the premium plants, which are labeled as such, are available for one ticket/or \$1.00. Premium plants are priced slightly higher. This is a wonderful and fun tradition for both the Garden Club and the residents of Hudson and beyond. Please come out and join us and hope for a sunny day....there is NOT a rain date.

HERB GROUP

On **Tuesday, September 19 at 10:45am** Herb Group members will have the opportunity to enjoy the 2017 Herb of the Year—Cilantro. We will be sampling recipes made by members using both Cilantro and Coriander, the spice, which is also the seed from which the cilantro plant grows.

We will also learn its history and how to grow it in our gardens. Cilantro is one of the most widely eaten herbs in the world. Even if you've never cooked with cilantro before, you've probably eaten it. Cilantro is a dominant ingredient in cuisines around the globe including Indian, Thai, Chinese, Mexican, Caribbean, Mediterranean, North African and Eastern European. Cilantro grows in regions ranging from southern Europe to northern Africa and western Asia. It is also one of the world's oldest herbs and has been used since ancient times. The seeds of the plant, also known as coriander, have even been found in ancient Egyptian tombs. Cilantro made its way over to the Americas in the 1600s when the Europeans first brought it over.

Coriander, although it comes from the same plant as cilantro, has a very different flavor profile. It's earthier with a spicy, citrus flavor. It's a main ingredient in garam masala, the Indian spice mix. It's also a major ingredient in Middle Eastern and Asian cuisines. In addition, coriander seeds are commonly added to pickling spices when making pickled vegetables like dill pickles. They're even used to brew certain types of beer, in particular Belgian wheat beers. Which is important since next year Hops is the Herb of the Year!

DAHLIA FIELD TRIP & SHOW

September and October are the peak of the Dahlia season, with blooms of every color except blue, in sizes from 2" to 12." Did you know that there are 57,000 registered cultivars of Dahlias in 14 flower type groups? Some of the flower types are cactus,

peony, water lily, single, double, ball, pom-pom.

Our field trip will take us to see the 500 Dahlias of a real Dahlia lover, Ron Miner of Chagrin Falls. Ron spoke to our Club a few years ago and welcomes us to visit his three gardens with 100 different Dahlia cultivars. One of his gardens is dedicated to a set of cultivars supporting a virus research project underway at Washington State University. He uses an organic approach in all the gardens and basically grows the plants in compost ("lasagna" beds). He is very fond of fully double cultivars.

Ron is a Dahlia Society of Ohio judge and exhibitor, and a past-president of and currently a trustee of the American Dahlia Society. He manages the ADS Trial Gardens and serves as the liaison between the ADS and Professor Pappu at Washington State University.

Learn about the wide variety of colors and shapes and sizes of this captivating flowerig plant that is a member of the same family as the lowly dandelion! Our field trip date is Saturday, September 30, 2017.
