Worth Watching! Painting the Modern Garden: Monet to Matisse

Spring is right around the corner, but until then, if you need a garden or a bit of bright color to cheer you, here's something worth watching!

Gardens and great works of art go hand-in-hand. The Royal Academy of Arts, London, had an extensive exhibition entitled "Painting the Modern Garden: Monet to Matisse". Gardens nurtured by some of the artists in the exhibition are captured in several short, two-four minute videos available on YouTube and linked below this article. The gardens in

France of artists Monet, Matisse, Henri Le Sidaner, Pierre Bonnard, and in Germany of artists Emil Nolde and Max Liebermann are included. You can see beyond these brief videos in a 90-minute documentary DVD of the same name; the DVD is in the Clevnet catalog and can be enjoyed by requesting it through the Hudson Library. These short videos and film journey from the gallery to the gardens which inspired the paintings, exploring how twentieth-century artists designed and cultivated their private gardens to consider color and form which would translate into their art.

We share these beautiful works of living art in memory of Martha Cailor who first shared this information with us. Martha was a long-time, generous member of HGC who recently passed away. Art inspired by gardens never goes out of date- these short videos are from 2016:

Snowdrops in the house!

Dig up a small clump of snowdrops. Be sure to dig deep enough to get the bulb and the roots beneath the bulb. Don't tease the bulbs apart; just pop the clump and the surrounding soil into a pot. Dress it up by placing moss on top of the soil. As soon as the bloom fades, replant them in the garden.

In Ohio, we have over 1000 native trees, shrubs, perennials, vines, and grasses that are important to our pollinators, birds, insects, and all wildlife including humans. They are part of an intricate, balanced web that helps to filter and clean our drinking water, remove contaminants from the air, cool our planet, and feed the bees that pollinate most of our food crops.

At the very core of this elaborate system are our native plants. Please support Ohio's native plant initiative by incorporating native plants into your yards and gardens and encouraging your neighbors to plant natives also. You will be rewarded when the birds and butterflies light up your life by visiting your neighborhood. Now through March 27th: Native Plant Sale Shared directly from Summit Soil and Water Conservation District website, source linked in article "This year, Summit Soil and Water Conservation District is expanding our Native Plant offerings to include single plants purchased in bundles of 3 plants. The price of a bundle is \$15.00. Please note, there is a \$12.95 handling charge for each order. Plants will be delivered directly to your address in mid-April. The herbaceous plants include some of our iconic woodland spring ephemerals and come in the form of bare roots and corms just out of dormancy and are less fragile, so the plants are easy to handle and plant right away when the ground is still soft in early April. The trees and shrubs are bare-root seedlings and should also be planted promptly to assure successful growth. If adding mulch when planting your trees and shrubs be sure not to place mulch around them any closer than 6 inches from the stem or trunk. This will help to prevent disease, insect infestation, and smothering of the roots. ORDER DEADLINE: Sunday, March 27th Payment must be received by March 27th to complete the order. Check back monthly for more tips! This month we suggest thinking beyond traditional vases as vessels for flowers. Here are some ideas to get you started: Have an assortment of containers to choose from. Garage sales are a good source. Save interesting bottles like maple syrup or salsa jars.

- Save a few glass jars to use to give away flowers.
- A canning jar can be a nice vase. Wrap the top edge with ribbon or raffia.
- Collect tiny vases and use one at each place setting or arrange in a line down the table
- As pictured, you can use these same containers to grow succulents or other plants while adding a pop of color to your table or shelf.


Hudson Garden Club Events
